Springboard Future Chef 2017 By Mrs Woods

At break time on Wednesday 11 January 2017 I met two very excited Brookfield Community School Year 10 students, Andrew Haslam and Juliet Wornes, ready to drive them to Sheffield Hallam University to take part in the first round of the Springboard Future Chef 2017 competition. After a lot of deliberation, Andrew and Juliet had been selected by their teachers to represent Brookfield in this prestigious event.

Having squeezed all their bags of ingredients and equipmen in to the boot of my car we set off. I don't think we took the kitchen sink, but there was definitely a blow torch, food processor, special plates and a lucky saucepan, as well as an array of ingredients. On arrival in Sheffield we managed to carry all the bags into the university and caught the lift to level 12 to find the Hospitality Management department – complete with a proper restaurant style area, professional kitchens and fantastic views of Sheffield and the hills beyond.



After meeting Kerry, the organiser from Springboard, and Derek, a SHU technician who would be supporting the students whilst they cooked, Andrew and Juliet disappeared with their equipment into the huge industrial sized kitchen to get set up ready for the competition to begin, only reappearing to don their 'chef's whites' of which they were very proud. Juliet was particularly thrilled because they had been told that SHU staff, 'the girls', would be doing the washing up for the competitors.

By this time the other competitors had arrived – two students each from Stockbridge High



School, Dronfield Henry Fanshawe School and Netherwood ALC. Finally after safety briefings and introductions to the judges the competition began in earnest. The judging panel was made up of three catering professional, including Chris Mapp, owner of the Tickled Trout in Barlow who acted as head judge, and Hayley, a Future Chef alumni and current SHU student. The brief was to cook a two course meal for two people (hot main course and a hot or cold dessert) with a budget of up to  $\epsilon_7$ , the first course to be ready within one hour, with a further 30 minutes to complete dessert.



Whilst the students were

cooking the four judges were on hand to observe and also to advise and help to get the very best out of the competitors. When each dish was completed one plate went to the judges for tasting, whilst the second was brought out to the waiting room for the anxious school staff to admire; all the dishes looked and smelled delicious. Juliet prepared duck with plum sauce, on a bed of potato and swede mash, with carrots and wilted spinach followed by frangipane tart with sweetened crème fraiche. Andrew prepared haddock on a bed of wilted spinach, with potato wedges and roasted carrots, and a parsley sauce, followed by a rice pudding crème brulee with shortbread biscuits.

After the judges had completed their deliberations each student was presented

with a certificate to confirm they had taken part in a local final, a Sheffield cook book and a grater, provided by sponsors of the competition. Then the final moment of reckoning. Andrew, Juliet and I were very proud when it was announced that Juliet had won the heat and would be going through to the South Yorkshire regional final in February. Juliet was presented with several cook books and a professional kitchen knife as well as an additional certificate. Chris Mapp also told Juliet he would now be acting as her mentor and she would get the opportunity to work in his kitchen.



#### Then,


unfortunately, Juliet had a very

#### THREE PEAKS CHARITY WALK

On Saturday 20th May 2017 three members of the school support team, Kim, Jeanette, Anita and their husbands did the Yorkshire Three Peaks Challenge which involved 25 miles of walking and climbing three of the tallest mountains in Yorkshire, Pen-y-Ghent (694 metres), Whernside (736 metres) and Ingleborough (723 metres).



We were up at half 4 am and after a quick breakfast we set off at half 6 from the café at Horton. Our first challenge was Pen-y-Ghent, it was a bit of a shock to the system at that time of the morning, it was a quick, steep ascent and as you are scrambling a bit near the top and there are some sheer drop's, it was a bit unnerving to say the least ...it was then someone in our group said the words we would hear a few times during that day "Whose idea was this?"



Throughout most of the walk it was warm and sunny, we did also have mist and some heavy rain but we didn't get the thunder and lightning that was forecast . . . which would have made the walk even more memorable! It was a brilliant challenge and we were really pleased that we did it just over our target time in 10 hours 5 minutes and raised £703 for Cancer Research. Thank you so much to everyone who donated.



16 students took part in a regional competition on 11 March 2017, at South Derbyshire Magistrates' Court for the Magistrates' Court Mock Trial Competition. The Magistrates' Court Mock Trial Competition is a national active learning project organised by The Citizenship Foundation, an independent charity which helps young people to engage with their community through education.

The Competition involved a team of students taking on the roles of magistrates, lawyers, witnesses and court staff to prepare a specially written case. Schools compete against each other in a live format at a real magistrates' court. The competition was tough and the year 9 team came a very close second.

# Geography visit to The Yorkshire Wildlife Park Mrs Rippin

97 students from Year 8 visited the Yorkshire Wildlife park. They collected information about different species of animals and how they had adapted to their environments. Students also went to a number of talks throughout the day. "We went to listen to the Meercat talkthey explained how they worked as a group and how they could eat scorpians."

"The Polar Bear talk was great we learned about how they hunted and how they had adapted to life in the Artic that they could swim really well. We also listen to how they are going to be endangered because of global warming."


Please do not park in numbered bays as these spaces are allocated for staff parking.

#### A YEAR IN DANCE

After a very successful winter term, with a charity showcase raising over £800 and two entries into the School Sports Partnership Dance showcase, 2017 has continued to provide dance success.

In January the Y12 A-Level students represented Chesterfield in the U.Dance Derbyshire platform and although they did not make it through to nationals, all the girls performed exceptionally. 2017 also saw a string of dance visits take place to extend the learning taking place in lessons. 2017 was also the first year that students visited Move IT! The UK's biggest Dance conference. Students took part in a range of seminars and workshops, as well as having the opportunity to find out about different training and careers and watch performances on the main stage. As always the Dance Evening saw high quality performances from both examination and KS3 students, with a fantastic range of choreographies and performances. We finished the year in style as part of a mass dance performance at Alton Towers and Artsfest all on the same day.

#### U.Dance, January 2017

As part of a national initiative set up with Youth Dance England and the Arts Council, U.Dance aims to give every child the opportunity to perform. As part of this there are county platforms staged throughout the year, with performers selected to perform at the annual national conference. This year 7 Y12 students from Brookfield represented the Chesterfield area with their piece "A Lady Through Picasso's Eyes", based on a painting by Pablo Picasso. While the girls weren't selected to progress in the selection process, the feedback they received was excellent and we hope to replicate this success in the future.



#### Theatre Trips

In September, Y13 students travelled to Nottingham to watch Alvin Ailey American Dance theatre. As well as enjoy an evening of dance, students had the opportunity to observe the dancers rehearsing before the show and talk to some of them afterwards.

In March, Y12 students travelled to Nottingham. This time it was to watch Rambert perform. As part of their trip students heard from the Artistic Director (Mark Baldwin) before the show, and again had the opportunity to talk to the dancers and rehearsal director afterwards.

#### Move IT!

Students set off before the crack of dawn to travel down to London for the day to take part in Move IT! 2017. Despite the early start, everyone was full of enthusiasm and excitement for a dance packed day ahead. After traversing the capital we arrived with plenty of time to look around before starting out schedule of seminars and workshops. Y13 students participated in dance workshops in a range of contemporary techniques, including Cunningham and Horton. Y12 firstly took seminars with Rambert and New Adventures, before finishing the day with a practical class. By the time we reached the end of the day, all students were laden down with information about training courses and summer school activities (and a few freebies!), and although it was a late return to Chesterfield every student was a positive representation of Brookfield.



#### Dance Evening, March 2017

This year's Dance Evening once again saw the best in dance at Brookfield. Y12 and 13 students showcased the examination work being produced in preparation for their exams and Miss Whitehouse showcased our KS3 clubs. 2017 also saw a new element to the Dance Evening. KS3 students had been given the opportunity to submit a choreography into an audition process in order to be performed on the night. 5 KS٦ choreographies were part of the program, celebrating the creativity in our younger years.





#### Alton Towers July 2017

On a hot day in July 11 students from Y8 and 12 joined 6 other schools from 4 counties to be part of the first Alton Towers school street dance project. Prior to the day a team from the entertainment department had visited Brookfield to teach students the choreography for the event, as well as tell them about the range of jobs available in the departments creative of Merlin Entertainment. When performance day came, we arrived early with plenty of time to rehearse, before heading out onto the Main Street to perform. They were fantastic!! # Options after Sixth Form at Brookfield

The Year 12 Guidance Programme Miss Lemmey

Our Year 12 Guidance Programme on Post-18 Options began in May with an informative presentation from Leeds University on the topic of "Choosing a Course".

Year 12 students then followed a weekly rotation of sessions on topics such as "Student Finance", "How to write a Personal Statement" and "Non-University Pathways". They have all been given help to register with the online application system, UCAS Apply 2018. Each form have also learnt from current Sheffield Hallam University students about university life; and have seen the range of careers resources and course guides available in Brookfield's Senior Library.

On Friday 14 July 2017 we hosted guest speakers from Chesterfield College, Sheffield Hallam University and AMRC Training, who gave valuable information on Higher Apprenticeships, degrees and other Higher Education courses. Year 12 students chose an afternoon workshop best suited to their current plans beyond Sixth Form and also had a 1:1 guidance interview.

In Year 13 form tutors take the lead role in supporting each individual student through the application process; and all Sixth Formers are encouraged to make the most of registration periods to keep their tutors informed of their plans and progress.

In praise of Year 12 students, many of the year group have been actively pursuing their future options for some time already by attending Open Days, arranging work experience where needed, seeking advice and using the many useful websites in the Blue Booklet provided to all Year 12 students. Others have sought out excellent opportunities to enhance their prospects by entering essay competitions and subject tournaments, taking free online courses and reading beyond their A level courses.

We wish all of Year 12 an enjoyable and productive summer and hope they start Year 13 with clear personal goals and bags of motivation to secure themselves a great course, apprenticeship, job or gap year opportunity.

#### Computing News Mr Pritchett

### **Bletchley Park**

Year eleven and twelve students visited Bletchley Park, the birthplace of the modern computing and Colossus, the computer that enabled the deciphering of German codes during WW2. Students were given a tour of the rebuilt Colossus and the main artefacts in the National Museum of Computing. This brought home to many of them the rate of change and progress in this subject. Year thirteen students attended some fascinating presentations about cities of the future and artificial intelligence at Warwick University. Their predictive algorithms are uncanny, whilst being used primarily to save heating costs, Interpol are interested in using them to predict future movements of suspects. An area that is getting too much like science fiction.



Computer Science students in years ten and twelve attended the Big Bang STEM fair at the NEC in March. The Big Bang is the UK's biggest celebration of science, technology and engineering. This inspirational visit featured a range of high technology companies, demonstrating their latest technology.







Year 10 Computer Science students attended Game Britannia at Sheffield Hallam University in June. This allowed students to develop games for the PlayStation using technology so sensitive that we had to ensure that it was not included on any photographs. Other student created robotic devices that had to navigate a course as quickly and accurately as possible.

# Duke of Edinburgh Award 2016-17: A Review

2016-17 got off to a fantastic start, with the last of the previous vear's Year 10 students finally completing their Bronze DofE. This brought the completion rate for that cohort to 100%, this has never been done before at Brookfield and is terrific testimony to the hard work and dedication of those students and the staff who supported them. Further investigation highlighted that no-one at Derbyshire DofE could remember any group gaining a 100% pass rate - so well done bronze 2015-16! We look forward to seeing many of those students back to undertake the Gold Award in September 2017.

The excitement of the previous year aside 2016-17 got underway with the successful recruitment of 40 students for the Bronze Award and 21 students for the Gold Award. For both awards there was the early outing of the day walk. In October the bronze students set off from Castleton to do a loop of the Great Ridge taking in Mam Tor, Hollins Cross and Lose Hill in fair weather. Whilst later, on Remembrance weekend, the gold students did a large loop on the shoulders of Kinder Scout in very tough and challenging conditions. The group also held a minutes silence to commemorate the war dead, remembering specifically the case of one of the many allied air wrecks that lie on the high ground of the Peak District.



After a winter of training and planning the expedition season started properly in March with the Gold Practice Expedition in the Yorkshire Dales. In a pattern that would repeat itself the gold students had to battle long routes and mixed weather conditions, including strong wind and driving rain. The bronze students then began their season with the training weekend near Birchover, followed by their Bronze Practice Expedition near Hartington and Hulme End. For both these expeditions the students were fortunate with dry conditions and fair weather. This inevitably meant it would rain on their Qualifying Expedition. However, spirits remained high and all 40 students passed the expedition section, the highest number Brookfield have ever put through the bronze expedition.



This left just the Gold Qualifying Expedition in the Lake District. The weather once again conspired against the students and the heavy rain arrived as we did and lasted through the first two days! The conditions



remained challenging for all three groups, with heavy rain, wet conditions and poor visibility broken up briefly by one afternoon of glorious sunshine. All groups coped admirably and showed the qualities necessary to earn the prestigious Gold DofE.

For the majority of the gold students there are many months of volunteering, physical pursuits and work still left to do, due to the extended time lines of the award. However, at the time of writing over 25 of the current bronze cohort have finished all their sections and thus the award. I hope all students continue to work towards their awards and reward the effort they all showed on their expeditions.

# **Online Safety**

Online Safety is an important part of keeping children safe at Brookfield Community School. Online Safety is taught to all pupils and our curriculum empowers students to understand and be aware how they can to stay safe and behave appropriately online but we can only be successful in keeping children safe online if we work with you.

Your help is needed to talk to your children about how they can keep themselves safe and behave appropriately online. It's important that we are all vigilant when children are using the internet and act to ensure they are protected from people who may pose a risk to them. Children can accidently or deliberately be exposed to illegal, unwanted or unpleasant content, comments or activity online and there are steps you can take at home to minimise this risk. What can parents do to help children keep safe online?

### Follow the "Gold"en Rules.

#### **GROUND RULES**

- Discuss together as a family how the internet will be used in your house. Consider what information should be kept private (such as personal information, photos in school uniform etc) and decide rules for making and meeting online friends. Ensure your children know the risks of accepting friends' requests from strangers online and make sure you know what your child is doing online; much like you would offline.
- Discuss using strong passwords with your child so they understand how they can protect their online accounts- talk about keeping passwords safe e.g. not sharing them with anyone or use the same password for several accounts. If your child's account is "hacked" or compromised then make sure they change their password and report any concerns or suspicious activity. For more advice on using strong passwords visit

- Consider locating your child's computers and laptops in a family area but be aware that children access the internet on mobile phones, games consoles and tablets so use can't always be supervised.
- Be especially aware of settings rules relating to your child's use of webcams and any applications or devices which allow voice or video chat. Childnet have useful information for young people about using webcams safely.

## **ONLINE SAFETY**

Install antivirus software, secure your internet connection and use Parental Control functions for computers, mobile phones and games consoles to block unsuitable content or contact from unknown people. Research different parental control software and tools available for your home and select the tools which are most suitable to you, your child and the technology in your home. Visit sites like

 Always remember that parental control tools are not always 100% effective and sometimes unsuitable content can get past them, so don't rely on them alone to protect your child.

## LISTEN

- Take an active interest in your child's life online and talk openly with them about the things they do. Talk to your child and ask them to show or even teach you how they use the internet, learn which websites or tools they like to use and why. Learning together with your child can often open opportunities to discuss safe behaviour online.
- To start a conversation with your child you could tell them that you understand that some young people share images and videos online and that you're interested to know what they think about it and how they think they can keep themselves safe.

# DIALOGUE – KEEP TALKING

 Ensure that your child knows that once a picture, video or comment is sent or posted online, then it can be very difficult to remove as other people can forward it and share it with others, without them even knowing.

# **Online Safety** (continued)

- Always ensure your child knows how to report and block people online who may send nasty or inappropriate messages or content. Encourage your child not to retaliate or reply to cyberbullying and to keep any evidence.
- Make sure your child knows it's important that they tell an adult they trust if anything happens online that makes them feel scared, worried or uncomfortable.

Remember, the internet is an essential part of young people's lives and provides them with tremendous opportunities. The vast majority use it without coming to any harm so it's essential to be realistic: banning the internet or web sites often will not work and it can make a child feel less able to report a problem or concern, so education around safe use is essential.

# Holidays in term time

On 6<sup>th</sup> April 2017 the Supreme Court appeal, in relation to the Platt v Isle of Wight case, determined that under section 444(1) of the Education Act 1996 attending school 'regularly' means:

"in accordance with the rules prescribed by the school"

Due to this, from 1st September, Derbyshire LA wil issue penalty notices for a period of unauthorised leave, regardless of a childs 'wider attendance'.

If leave is requested during the 2017/18 academic year on the basis that it was booked prior to the release of these arrangements and evidence can be provided, issuance of a penalty notice will be considered under the previous 'below 94%' arrangements.
